### **The Heathdale Story**

The Heathdale community welcomed its first students on the 10th of February in 1982 and has been providing authentic Christian education to families in the western suburbs of Melbourne ever since. Our educational approach is rooted in the Word of God and focuses on nurturing the whole child—academically, spiritually, physically and emotionally. This fundamental belief shapes our College's identity and helps each child thrive from a Christ-centred perspective.

We value the partnership between parents and the school, fostering a love of learning and curiosity throughout each student's educational journey. As students grow into young adults, we aim to develop their deep understanding and wisdom.

Our goal is to instil Christian values such as integrity, honesty, respect, love, honour and truth, all which inspire students to discover their God-given potential and serve both locally and globally.

At Heathdale, a student's learning journey can begin in Kindergarten and continue through to Year 12. We offer a wide range of subjects and robust learning programs that encourage excellence in all areas of life. The early years focus on building a strong foundation in literacy, numeracy, science, and humanities. In early secondary school, students explore various subjects, learn up to three languages, participate in sports for personal growth and competition, study science, maths, creative and visual arts, embrace leadership opportunities, and engage in community service. This diverse curriculum leads to one of the most extensive selections of subjects for VCE, VCE VM and VET in the western suburbs. Our aim is to empower students to achieve outstanding results and feel confident as they move forward in their life's journey. With this solid educational platform, we provide each student with a unique pathway beyond school.

By August 2024, we had grown to 2332 students (Kinder to Year 12) across our Melton and Werribee campuses. The College's Federal Government's Direct Measure of Income (DMI) model, calculated Heathdale's capacity to contribute (CTC) score as 100.

We honoured that legacy during our celebrations, as well as those who came before and since.

Over the past 10 years, Melton has blossomed into a vibrant campus, now home to over 500 students, and a place where academic excellence and spiritual growth flourish hand in hand.

2024 marked a major milestone for Melton with the introduction of VCE and the anticipation of our first Year 12 graduating class in 2025. This growth reflects God's faithfulness and the dedication of staff, students and families.

Although our campuses have unique geographical and cultural expressions, they form one community that is of the same essence, committed to fostering each student's holistic growth. I want to thank our Executive Principal, Ross Grace, our senior leadership team and all our staff for their efforts to continue to deliver on our Christ-centred mission. I also want to thank every parent for their partnership. Together, we continue to support our students as they grow into the people God created them to be.



### **Executive Principal's Perspective**

ooking back on 2024, I'm reminded of how each year as winter moves into spring, subtle changes begin to take place. At first almost imperceptible but gradually unfolding until the new season bursts forth in full colour.

Tesselaar's Tulip Farm in Silvan is a well-known springtime landmark. Each year, it draws thousands who come to marvel at the rows upon rows of vibrant tulips—flowers of every colour, size and shape stretching across the fields. Yet this incredible display doesn't happen overnight. It is the result of quiet, consistent work: preparing the soil, planting bulbs, and tending the garden through the seasons.

In many ways, 2024 at Heathdale Christian College unfolded in the same way: small shifts, steady effort, and the blossoming of something beautiful across both our Melton and Werribee campuses.

Towards the end of the year, as I walked through our grounds and classrooms, I was struck by the life and energy that filled our learning spaces. I found myself reflecting on what these places once were. Forty-five years ago, Werribee was still open paddocks, and the road outside was a single-lane dirt track. Fifteen years ago, the Melton site was a long-abandoned campus, marked by graffiti and neglect. Ten years ago, just sixty students and four staff came together to begin something new in Melton, and in 2024, that campus flourished with 500 students and 45 staff, all preparing to offer Year 12 in 2025.

The transformation has been nothing short of remarkable. What were once overlooked spaces became thriving, vibrant learning communities. Places families actively sought for a Christ-centred education, and students were proud to call their own.

But just like Tesselaar's tulips, none of this came about by chance. It was the fruit of faithful and sustained effort of teachers, support staff, leaders, parents and students alike. Each person played their part in building something lasting, and we remained deeply grateful for those who laid the foundations. We truly stood on their shoulders.

I was reminded of Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 3:16, when he wrote of how the early Church grew: "One planted, another watered, but God caused the growth." That was true of our story too. While people came and went over the decades, God's goodness, enabling, and faithfulness remained constant. He was the one who caused the growth.

In 2024, we celebrated 10 years of the Melton campus. We broke ground on exciting new developments at Werribee. We continued to shape young lives through Christ-centred learning, supported by a dedicated and growing team. And we rejoiced in all that God had done and was continuing to do.

I invite you to join the Board, Senior Leadership Team and I in giving thanks to God for the year we had—for His unfailing faithfulness, for the growth He caused and for the hope we carry into the future because of Him.

# **Belonging Day**

# **First Day of Year 12**

The much-anticipated commencement of Melton Campus's first ever Year 12 class took place last November through the 'Early Start' program, where Year 11 students began their studies in their chosen Year 12 subjects for 2025.

After completing their exams, these pioneering students stepped into this new phase of their schooling. On the Monday 11th November, both Years 10 and 11 students participated in a step-up day, during which they were introduced to the requirements and structures of the VCE. This internal program, designed and delivered by Melton campus staff, also supported parents, many of whom were navigating VCE for the first time alongside their children; after all, the whole family does VCE, not just the students!

The school community was encouraged to uphold these families in prayer during that time and for the year ahead. The College expressed gratitude for the contributions this inaugural Year 12 cohort had already made to the school and looked forward to seeing the ways they would continue to shape and strengthen the community. By the same time this year, they would have completed their schooling, proudly marking Melton's first ever graduating class.







## Award-winning Christian education

Heathdale Christian College was honoured as the 2024 Independent School Winner for Melbourne's west in The Age's prestigious 'Schools that Excel' awards.

Each year, this award recognises Victorian schools that have made remarkable improvements in their VCE performance over the past decade. Only ten schools across the state—one government and one independent school from each of five regions—receive this recognition.

The Age highlighted that our College's median VCE study score reached a 10-year high of 31 last year, climbing from 28 in 2014. In addition, the percentage of students achieving a study score of 40 or above rose to 8.4 percent, compared with 4.4 percent in 2014.

This achievement is a testament to the dedication of every staff member at Heathdale Christian College, who work faithfully each day to bring glory and honour to God. We give all glory to Him for guiding our journey and express our deepest thanks to the Heathdale community for their steadfast support and commitment to excellence in Christian education. Together, we are building a future that honours Him!

Thomas' journey began right here at Heath-dale, where he first picked up a volleyball during PE classes and honed his skills through the afterschool volleyball program led by Mrs Janet Steane. Supported by passionate teachers like Mr Johnny Williams and Mr Jim Graham, Thomas' potential blossomed, eventually taking him from school courts to international arenas. His story is a remarkable example of how our College empowers students to reach their God-given potential, both on and off the court.

Throughout his career, Thomas has competed at the highest levels in both indoor and beach volleyball, representing Australia in World Championships and now at the Olympics. His journey hasn't been

easy – from overcoming injuries to captaining the Australian Men's Volleyball team, Thomas has shown resilience and a commitment to excellence. As a student, he not only excelled in sports but also earned an Engineering degree while on a volleyball scholarship in the USA.

In the words of Executive Principal Ross Grace, "We were thrilled to be cheering on one of our former students, Thomas, who not only represented his country but also his family, friends and his former school.

Thomas' coaches from Heathdale fondly remember his time at school. Mr Williams recalled, "I was the coach of Thomas' first volleyball team back in Year 7. He was always a natural blocker, and from the beginning, he had a gift for the game. Watching him grow into the player he is today has been amazing."

Mrs Steane added, "Thomas was always dedicated and motivated in his sporting pursuits. He found his passion in volleyball and excelled through every challenge. His success today is a testament to his perseverance and talent."

As a College, we are immensely proud of Thomas' achievements and the role we played in nurturing his talents. From receiving MVP awards to having an award named after him, Thomas has left an indelible mark on Heathdale Christian College and continues to inspire our students, particularly our aspiring athletes.





s part of our year-long celebration of 10 years of thriving in God's grace in the Melton area, we held a portrait exhibition and awards ceremony for the inaugural Imago Dei Prize in our own gallery space. The night saw local dignitaries, families, College leadership and staff all coming together to celebrate our students and their considerable portrait artworks.

Inspired by the prestigious Archibald Prize, our Year 11 VCE Art Making and Exhibiting students painted portraits of their teachers, reflecting not only their likeness but also their personality. Guided by Secondary Art Teacher, Mrs Hannah Cutter, our emerging artists developed their own artistic styles using a mix of acrylic paint, coloured pencil, ink and mixed media.

"When they were working, our gallery space was set up like a studio," explained Mrs Cutter. "Students had a sense that their peers were on each other's team and were going to support one another throughout the process. It felt like having professional support, as students were helping critique each other's work in meaningful ways. There was a lot of constructive discussion about proportion, colour theory and technique as the students worked through their projects."

The Imago Dei Prize was presented by Cr. Sophie Ramsay, Councillor for Coburn Ward, to Lily Attard for her portrait of our Melton Campus Principal, Mr Iain Belot. Lily captured her subject's essence with outstanding technical skill, imagination

and understanding. 'Imago Dei' comes from the Latin translation of Genesis 1:27 and means 'Image of God'. We chose this name for our highest prize because at Heathdale, we believe that every person is made in God's image, as taught to us in the Bible.

The artwork is titled 'A Love for Reading' and was created using pencil, ink, and collage on paper.

"When creating my artwork, I loved trying to include all the things that Mr Belot told me he loved and adding deeper meaning through the details," explained Lily. "I was nervous and surprised when I found out I had won the Imago Dei Prize because, while I enjoy drawing people, this was a much larger piece, which was a challenge."

The Atelier Award, voted for by the Year 11 Art class, was presented to Davina Vo by Kaylee Smith, Electorate Officer from the Office of Steve McGhie MP.

Additionally, the People's Choice Award, which celebrated the favourite portrait as voted by our wider College community in the lead-up to the Imago Dei Award Ceremony, was presented to Natasha Lakra by our Executive Principal, Ross Grace.

The exhibition was a testament to the talent and dedication of our Year 11 Art students, who would go on to be part of our Melton campus' inaugural class of Year 12s in 2025.

### Offers and Placements

In 2024, our Year 12 students received early entry offers to a range of Bachelor degree courses at universities including RMIT, Latrobe, Swinburne, ACU and Victoria University. Some students also qualified for Melbourne Uni Access and the Monash Guarantee. The courses offered spanned areas such as Science, Biomedicine, Design, Law, Arts, Criminology, Business, Psychology, Architecture, Engineering, Information Technology and Commerce. While students are not required to accept these offers, they provide a guaranteed pathway based on their previous academic achievements.

It's been such a gift and blessing from God, and it's really important not to forget him in all of this or the people who supported me. arcey Gifford's achievement as the highest Dux ever at Heathdale reflects her love for studying and the supportive environment she found at the school. Initially, Darcey was unsure about being named Dux and needed time to grasp the significance of her high score. "When I saw the score, I don't think I realised how high it was," she reflected.

For Darcey, this accomplishment was more than just a number; it was an unexpected blessing. "I feel like I've spent a lot of time just kind of going, why me? This is such an abundant blessing from God, beyond anything I'd even imagined," she shared.

Starting at Heathdale in Year 11, Darcey quickly experienced its welcoming and supportive atmosphere, which helped her thrive. This support extended to her teachers, who were always available to assist with questions and personal challenges. "A big shout-out to Mr Sega, my Biology teacher. He had a group of us keen on Biology and ran extra lunchtime sessions," she added.

This year, Darcey is pursuing a Bachelor of Science at the University of Melbourne. Although still deciding on her career path, she finds the journey exciting. "It's terrifying but exciting at the same time. I try and lean into that."

Balancing study and rest in school was key to Darcey's success. She set study limits, observed a weekly Sabbath—avoiding both her phone and studying on Sundays—and made sure to enjoy family time. "We still read books out loud, even though we're older now," she shared, mentioning their journey through the Chronicles of Narnia last year.

Darcey advises future students to use their teachers' expertise. "They are there to help you out in any way they can. I sent them a lot of questions, practice pieces and asked them to explain concepts when they didn't quite make sense."

She also encourages making studying enjoyable. "One thing my friends can tell you is that in Year 12, I became obsessed with drinking tea. I'd drink tea while studying and tried all kinds of flavours." Darcey highlights the importance of finding study strategies that suit your individual style. "Some people found study timetables helpful, but they didn't work for me. Instead, I used timers to tackle tasks, especially the ones I didn't want to do. Others tried timers and found them unhelpful, so it's really about discovering what works best for you."

When Darcey learnt she was Dux, it was a surreal moment. "It's been such a gift and blessing from God, and it's really important not to forget Him in all of this or the people who supported me. Receiving this honour doesn't reflect all the people who made that number possible. I want to thank my Biology study group for their support, my parents for encouraging me and helping me take breaks, and my friends. There are many people from Heathdale I think I'll stay in touch with, who truly cared for me."

Darcey's experience serves as a reminder of what can be achieved when dedication meets encouragement, inspiring both students and educators to strive for their best.

he Heathdale Cup, initiated by Mr Gavin Abrahams and Mr Heinrich Fourie, was born from a desire to create more sporting opportunities for Heathdale Christian College students and foster community across the Werribee and Melton campuses. Inspired by previous competitions against Tyndale Christian College, the idea of inter-campus games was presented, and the first Cup was held in Term 4 of 2023.

Since then, its scope has grown to include a wider range of sports and year levels. Events have included basketball, soccer, badminton and volleyball. While Werribee's larger student body initially gave them an advantage, Melton students have embraced the challenge. The 2024 Year 9 boys' basketball final, where Melton closed the gap from a heavy loss the previous year to just two points, captured this determination.

The Cup has built cross-campus friendships, strengthened staff collaboration, and created a culture of unity. Teacher vs student games and regular termly events ensure these bonds continue to grow. The sight of Werribee students clapping Melton onto the bus after a match reflects the event's spirit—showcasing God-given talents and the strength of one College community across two campuses. # **Capital Works**

In 2024, we continued the development of both our campuses in line with the College's strategic directions of creating vibrant and purposeful spaces for all our students and staff so they can deepen their learning in all areas and explore God's world around them with increasing curiosity. We thank God for the continued investment by our families into the Heathdale community, and look forward to how these facilities will be used to serve generations now and into the future.





### **Gradual Preparation for VCE Graduation**

As we continued to expand our VCE offering at the Melton campus and anticipated our first graduating class in 2025, works were underway on the redevelopment of three buildings into purposeful VCE and Secondary School learning spaces set for completion and use in 2025: a VCE Learning Hub, Study Centre and Science Centre.

The Learning Hub was designed with seven classroom learning zones and a breakout area. Hosting our Year 11 and 12 students and staff, the VCE Study Centre was developed to help our most senior students get the most out of their studies, while also providing a welcoming space for them to relax and bond as a cohort and focus on their wellbeing.

The Science Centre was also scheduled for complete renovation, with labs for Chemistry, Biology and Physics, alongside a complementary maker space to extend our existing Science facilities. All three facilities were planned with designs to inspire students and enhance learning through flexible theoretical and practical zones.

#### **Werribee Looks Outwards**

On our Werribee campus, after delivering two significant new builds in 2022 and 2023 with the establishment of the Year 7–8 precinct, The Village, and the Year 1–2 Building with its surrounding play areas, the focus of the next stage in our Werribee masterplan turned to the campus's outdoor spaces.

The removal of the J Block demountable structure at the front of the College opened up more green space for our upper Primary students. Combined with the introduction of additional Gaga pits (a popular playground ball sport) and the installation of new adventure playground equipment, the Year 3–6 play area was redesigned to better suit our older students, since the Year 1–2 students had moved to the Kinder–2 precinct.

To enhance the drop-off and pick-up experience for families, the first stage of car park works commenced towards the end of 2024, expanding the footprint of the Creative Arts car park and connecting it with the ELC car park. This update significantly enhanced traffic flow by linking both entrances and exits onto Derrimut Road, increasing the number of available parking spaces and introducing a dedicated Kiss 'n' Drop zone.

To continue catering for the growth of our student body, internal refurbishment works also created an additional Year 6 classroom in F Block, as well as an expansion of our Secondary administration area.

### **Melton Gets Creative with Its Spaces**

At our Melton campus, after the delivery of the Secondary B Block precinct in 2023, two key projects completed in 2024 were the refurbishments of the Drama Hall and Gym learning space.

The Drama Hall refurbishment widened the stage wings to centre it to the building and make room for our student performers, repainting the building and stage floor, new furnishings and installing a high-quality audio-visual system with multiple modes that can deliver simple presentations to full stage performances. It has seen significant use by our students through assemblies and events like the inaugural Talent Show.

The refurbishment of the gym learning space included a leading physical training gym, classroom environment and staff offices. This upgrade will continue to support our Secondary curriculum and co-curricular Physical Education and sporting programs for years to come.



# Partnership with Goodstart ELC

Our Melton campus embraced the spirit of 'Thriving in God's Grace' by launching a new community partnership with Goodstart Early Learning Centre (ELC) in Melton in 2024.

Commencing in Semester 2, our Year 6 students enjoyed an initial visit to Goodstart ELC, connecting with their 3 and 4-year-old Kindergarten students and carers. This marked the start of a monthly program in which Heathdale visits Goodstart ELC, and their Kinders come to the 'big school' to play with our Year 6 students on our campus.

Some of the Goodstart Kinders were set to begin Prep in 2025, making this initiative a wonderful orientation for them. The partnership also allows our Year 6 students to demonstrate leadership by buddying with the Kinders and leading fun activities, including arts and crafts, songs, games and story time.

As our Melton campus celebrated its 10th anniversary in 2024, this growing community partnership beautifully reflected the following scripture: "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." (1 Peter 4:10)



### **Cameron Crombie**

**Teaching Staff - Melton** 



#### What motivated you to pursue a career in teaching?

I've always loved seeing students grow in their understanding. When I worked in university labs, I found great joy in watching students connect the dots and see how everything interlinked. Teaching feels natural to me. Having grown up with a mum who was a teacher and a dad who was a flight instructor, guiding others in their learning journey has always been part of my life.

### What influenced your decision to join Heathdale as a staff member in 2024?

I initially hesitated to complete my application, as I'd been working in a public school where faith conversations weren't welcome. A phone call from the HR Manager reassured me that Heathdale genuinely values open, respectful discussions about Christian views. Meeting Nick, Iain and Ross confirmed that the leadership here is strong, faith-filled and welcoming, which made me excited to join the team.

### What were some of your favourite memories at Heathdale in 2024?

One of my first memories is stepping into a classroom as a Casual Relief Teacher and asking students to complete their set work. Every student opened their tablet and got straight to it—no pushback, just a willingness to learn. It gave me an early glimpse of the wonderful culture here.

### How did the support and mentorship from College leadership and colleagues contribute to your growth as an educator and coordinator in your first year at Heathdale?

The support at Heathdale has been amazing. Everyone is genuinely willing to help, even if you've never worked with them before. There are no silos, people collaborate freely, and shared approaches flow across subjects. That openness has made my growth as an educator so much richer.

# Describe how Heathdale's culture aligns with your values as an educator and how Heathdale's Christian work environment influenced your 2024 experience.

Heathdale's openness to talk about faith and support students spiritually is a huge blessing. We can help them see that God loves them, has a plan for their lives and that His truth brings hope. In my previous public school, mental health challenges were widespread but we couldn't discuss faith. Here, being able to share God's love gives students comfort and strength that goes far beyond academics.

#### What motivated you to pursue a career in student welfare?

Ultimately it was God's calling that led me to work in the student welfare space. I've always loved being around people and wanted to pursue a career focused on caring for others, particularly in the mental health space, so I decided to complete a double Bachelor of Social work and Psychology. Mental health struggles among young people are so common and too many young people feel that they are alone in their struggle. God has really placed a soft spot in my heart for this age group, which has led me to work with young people to support them through their mental health difficulties and to be a safe adult in their life who listens to them, believes in them and supports them in becoming the person God has planned for them to be.

### What influenced your decision to join Heathdale as a staff member in 2024?

Before working at Heathdale, I actually did not know much about the school. One day I felt prompted to just open the Heathdale website and see if they happened to have a job on offer for student wellbeing, and they did! Once I applied, the further I went along in the interview process, the more staff I met and the more I learnt about the culture and values of the school, it came clear to me what a beautiful, supportive and Christ-centred community Heathdale is—and I wanted to be a part of it!

### What were some of your favourite memories at Heathdale in 2024?

I have loved getting to know the students and have been so amazed at how open and welcoming they have been. I was impressed by the way the student leadership team organised Belonging Day last year and I really enjoyed being apart of that. I have also had the opportunity to go on a few camps with Secondary, which has been so much fun and a great way to get to know staff and students better.

### How did the support and mentorship from College leadership and colleagues contribute to your growth in Student Welfare in your first year at Heathdale?

Heathdale has been the most supportive community I have been a part of in my working life. As a fairly new social worker, I have felt so supported and cared for by the leadership team as they have answered my many (many...) questions and worked with me to build my confidence and capacity. I really value connection and have so appreciated the way the leadership team has worked with me to problem-solve, soundboard ideas and work out ways to support students better. The Staff PD weeks at the start of the year and mid-year have left me feeling much better equipped to do my role well. I feel that because of the support of the leadership team, I have been able to grow as a person both professionally and personally.

# Describe how Heathdale's culture aligns with your values as a Student Welfare Officer and how Heathdale's Christian work environment influenced your 2024 experience.






### **Heathdale Christian College Income**
