of a large parcel of land to begin a Christian school that would provide local families in the area with an education based on a Christian worldview and Biblical perspective. He saw the importance of Christian education for parents and families in aligning the values of home, school life and Church. He believed that God placed this vision on his heart for families in the Western suburbs of Melbourne.

As you can imagine there were many things involved in starting a school: buildings, funding, registration, staff and of course, enrolling students. Through all this, Rev. Joe is instrumental in praying for these plans to become reality and bringing the right people and resources together to commence our school. “We didn’t know what to do until it became apparent what we had to do,” he reflected. “Our problems are God’s opportunities.” Such a statement of faith was testament to the life he lived and how faithful God is.

With enough funding for some portable buildings, 38 student enrolments and a temporary ‘School Registration’ from the Registered Schools Board, Joe and his fellow founding Board members began operating Heathdale Christian College in 1982. Little could Joe have known what God had planned for Werribee and also Melton. Still, through his humble obedience and his desire to follow God’s calling, he put one foot in front of the other to facilitate the opening of our school.

Rev. Joe was dedicated to serving God wholeheartedly and followed the vision for this school that God had laid on his heart. “We would teach the kids Christianly – not be an exclusive school just for Christians.”

We know that Rev. Joe followed his beloved Saviour God and is praising Him in Heaven. Although he will be sorely missed, his legacy will remain.

This year, Reverend Joe Westlake peacefully passed away. Many of our Heathdale community never met this man, however he is one of the primary reasons our College exists today. It was Rev. Joe who followed the call from God to begin a Christian school in the Western suburbs.

His story of involvement with our College is one you may have heard before. Imagine our Werribee campus as an open grass paddock, with no classrooms, no carparks and no people! All the eye could see were open fields with sheep, cows, and – in the centre of Hoppers Crossing – a train station accompanied by several newly built display homes dotted along Heaths Road. Beyond that – between our College and the You Yangs – there was just farming land. With the traffic around Wyndham, it is very hard to imagine indeed!

Reverend Joe was the Pastor at Werribee Baptist Church at this time and proposed the purchase



Introduction

The largest range of subjects occur through Year 7 & 8, as students learn up to three languages, compete in sports, study science, maths, creative and visual arts, embrace leadership opportunities and participate in community service.

The College tailors its curriculum and co-curricular programs, all based on God’s Holy Bible, for each student to pursue and launch into the next phase of their life. At August 2019, we had grown to 1620 students (Kinder to Year 12) across our Melton & Werribee campuses. The College’s current Federal Government’s ICSEA (Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage) rating is 1140.

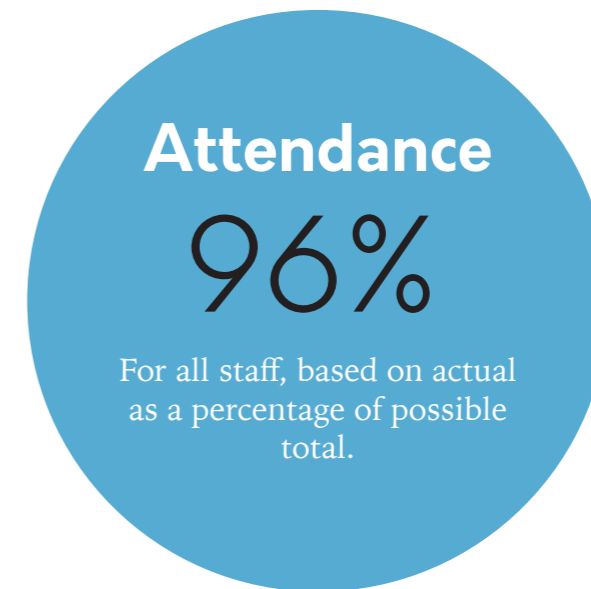
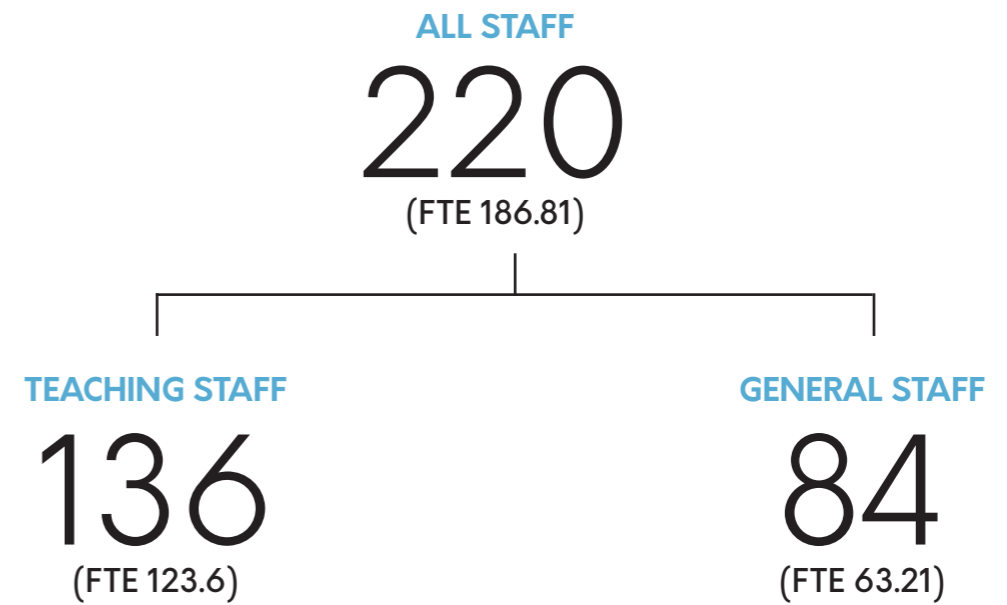
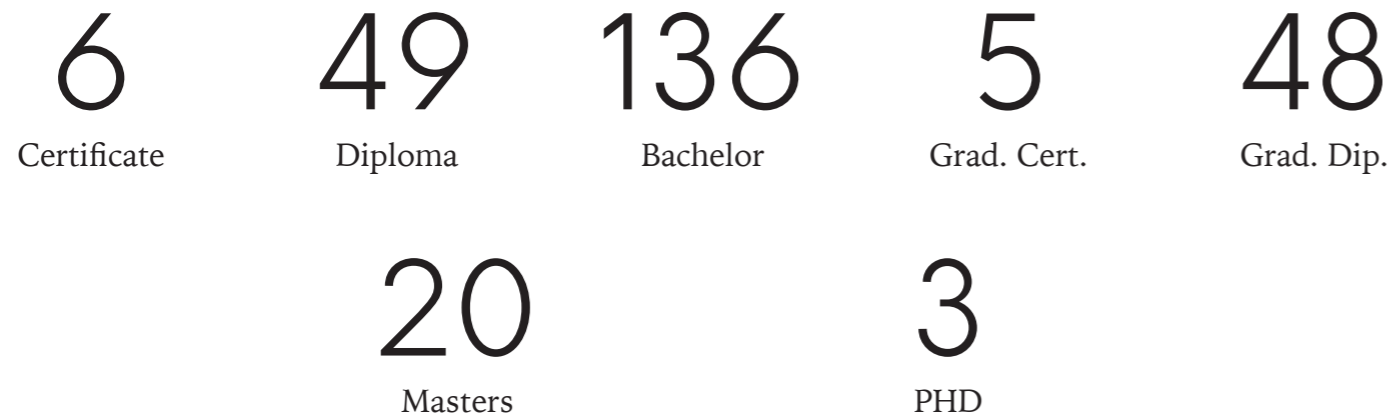


Staff Profile

- 37% have served in our College for over 10 years, showing their dedication to our students.

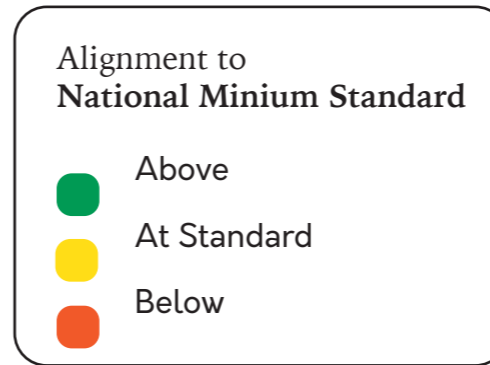

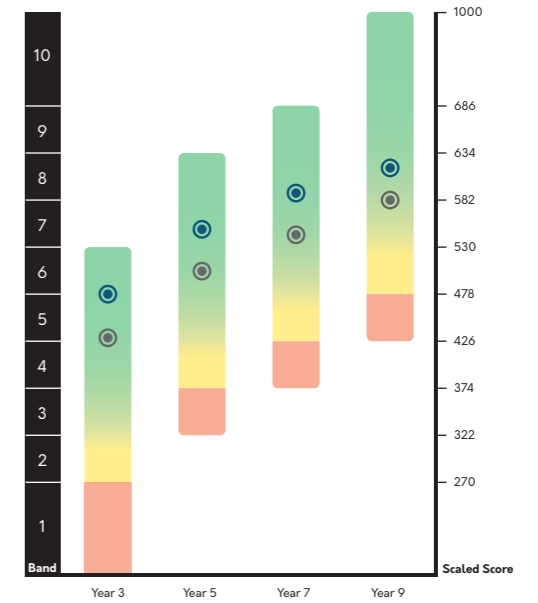
NAPLAN Results

Heathdale students routinely tested above the Australian schools average in all areas, across all year levels. Compare Heathdale's results to the National Average and NAPLAN standardisation.

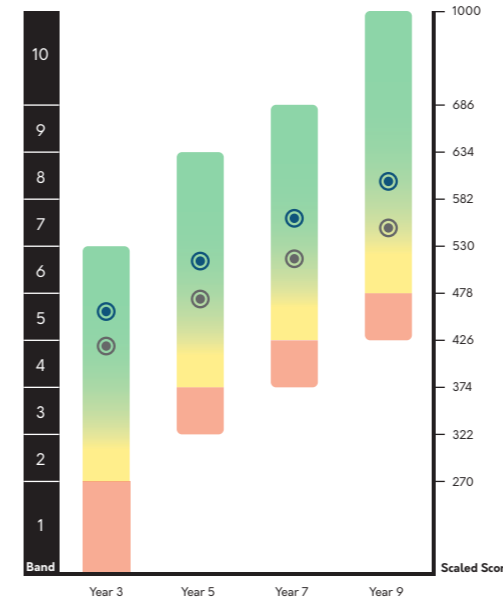

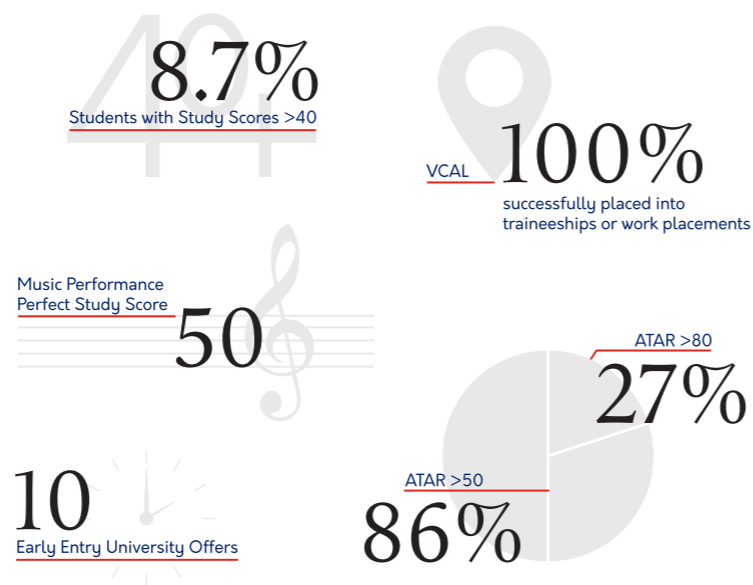
Class of 2019 Highlights

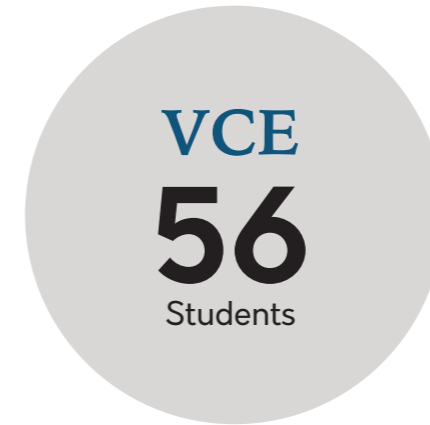

- Individual results in Physics and Music Performance achieving study scores of well over 45.

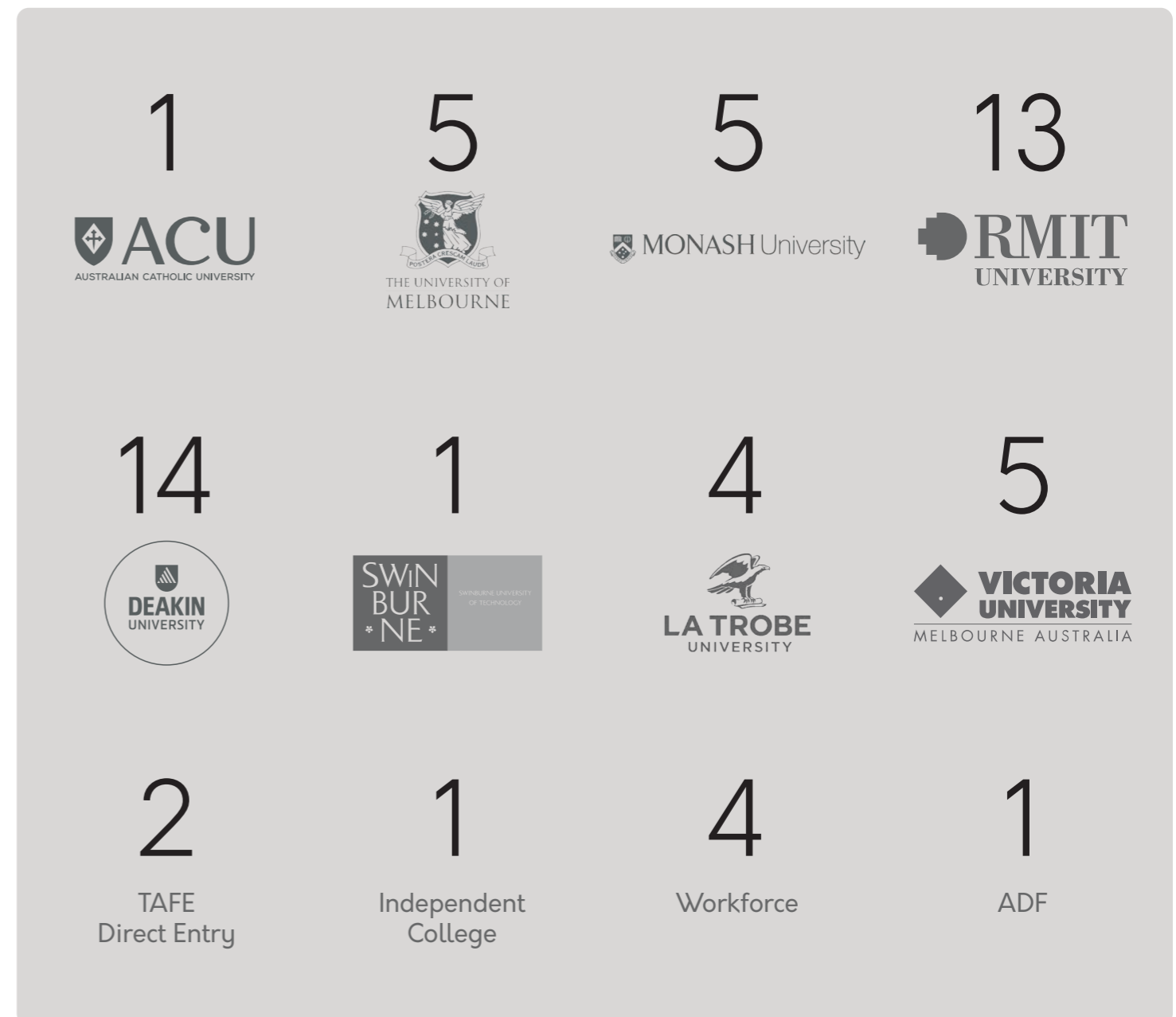


Overall Class Achievements

Year 5 Camp

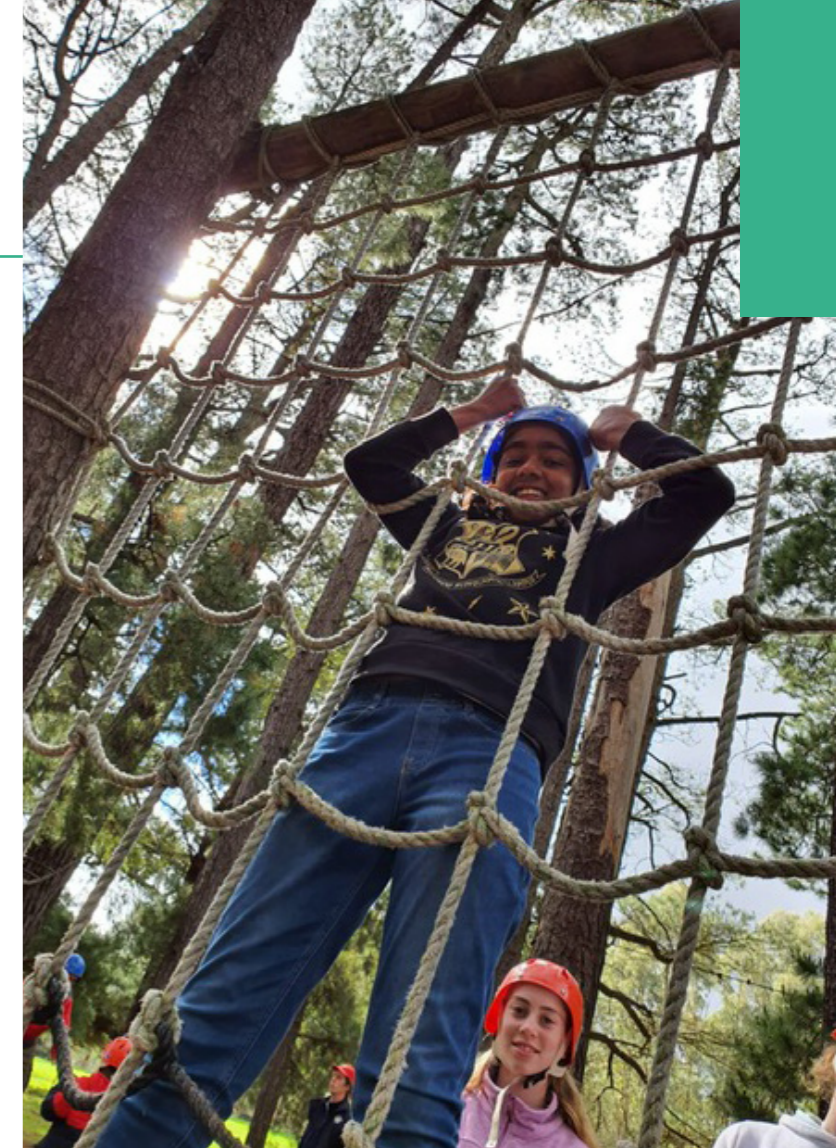

Rehoboth Pancakes

Rehoboth Children’s Home is dear to the hearts of many students and staff. It provides a safe haven for 35 children who have been orphaned, abandoned, surrendered, abused or neglected by their birth family.

Each year, our Philippines Trip team spends time there, helping however they can. As a school, the students also raise money to support them financially throughout the year, such as the Pancake Fundraiser run by the Year 11 VCAL students. They cooked up stacks, poured over the syrup and dolloped out ice cream for our Middle and Senior students.

The money raised helps keep the Home running and the kids off the streets. Over the years, the funds have gone towards important items like chairs, cooling fans, keeping medical certification and supplies up-to-date, and basics like toothpaste, toothbrushes and clothing.

Operation Christmas Child

In late October, Junior School students gathered outdoors to send a stack of shoeboxes away on the school maintenance ute. The boxes – full of Christmas presents for children – will likely end up somewhere in a distant land as part of Samaritan’s Purse Operation Christmas Child. Our students and their families have been diligently packing the boxes with some basic amenities, educational supplies and a few fun things, too. It’s given the children a chance to think and talk about giving while engaging in an act of generosity, as well as praying for children just like them in other countries.



Slavery Gets Served

For the first year, Heathdale’s Ping-Pong-a-Thon was entirely student led. The Ping-Pong-a-Thon is a global event to raise money for the fight against slavery. With over 40 million people still in slavery, our students showed their passion for others’ freedom by either organising events, playing ping pong, buying a sausage, or attending a fundraiser.

“This year I have had the privilege of being a part of the organising team of the Ping-Pong-a-Thon. To have the ability to give someone a life of freedom and a life of new opportunities is one of the most humbling and rewarding I have. Every student and staff member have thrown themselves into the Ping Pong-a-thon with great passion, enough to impact hundreds of lives. The entire Heathdale population has pushed itself for the benefit of others, whom they have never met and probably never will. To see this spirit of generosity and compassion permeate through the staff and students has been an inspiration for the team of students organising to push on and to continue Heathdale’s fight for freedom.

The experience of organising the Heathdale Ping-Pong-a-Thon event has been an interesting one. It has presented many challenges and has required a lot of time and energy from all involved. But the fight for freedom is worth it and with the committed support of students, staff and parents I am convinced that the movement towards a world where no one lives under the oppressive and violent nature of slavery will continue into the future. Let it be known that Heathdale hates slavery.”

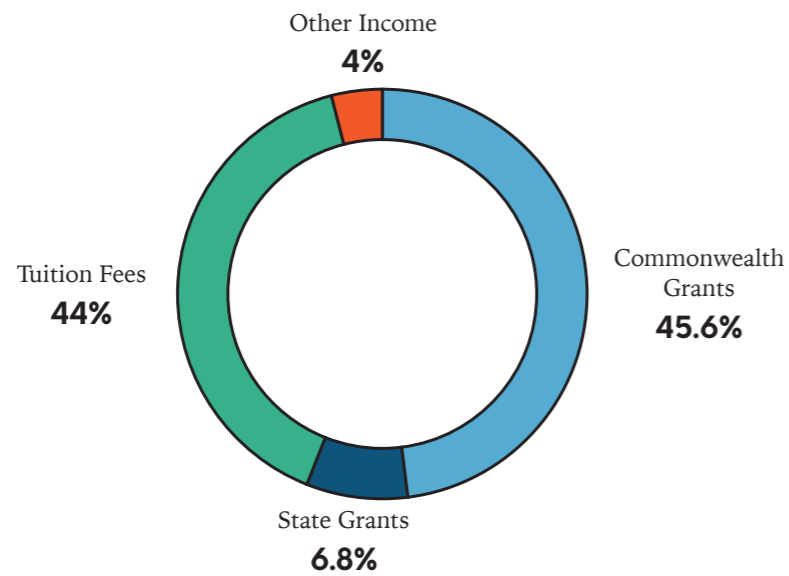

Financial Activities

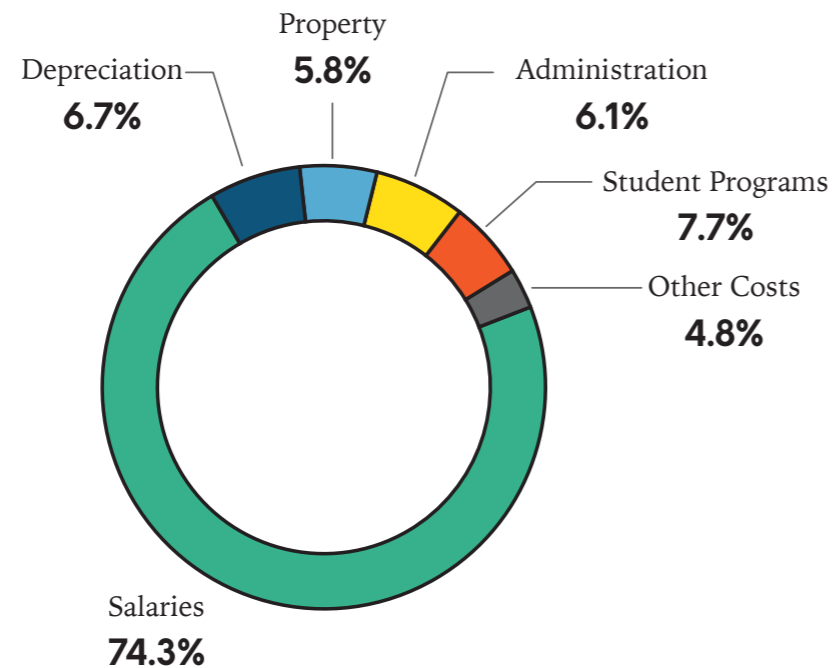
